



Barent Fabritius, The Pharisee and the Publican 1661; oil on canvas - Rijksmuseum

Dutch artist Barent Fabritius painted the parable of the *Pharisee and the Publican* commissioned by and hung in the Lutheran Church in Leiden. The centre section between the columns depicts the moment of the two prayers. The Pharisee's face is lifted up and illuminated as he kneels before an altar. His gesture points towards himself and to the Publican. He talks to God about himself and what he has not done – robbing others, doing evil or committing adultery. The tax collector stands in the shadow behind a column, his face turned down knowing he is a sinner and unable to lift his eyes to heaven. He knows he must pray with humility, ask God to forgive his sins and show him mercy.

On each side of this scene are two other sections, divided from the Temple setting by square pilasters. In each setting the two men are leaving the Temple returning to their homes and normal lives. The Pharisee is preceded by a horned and winged devil carrying a mask, a symbol of deception and how others perceive him. By contrast, the tax collector leaves the Temple overseen by an angel. He is full of remorse for his sins but knowing only God's mercy could save him. As Jesus said "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven".¹



THE EPISTLE (read by Jayne Ringrose)

The Epistle is written in the fifteeth chapter of the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians, beginning at the first verse.

B RETHREN, I declare unto you the Gospel which I preached unto you, which also ye have received, and wherein ye stand: by which also ye are saved, if ye keep in memory what I preached unto you, unless ye have believed in vain. For I delivered unto you first of all, that which I also received, how that Christ died for our sins, according to the Scriptures; and that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day, according to the Scriptures; and that he was seen of Cephas; then of the twelve: after that, he was seen of above five hundred brethren at once; of whom the greater part remain unto this present, but some are fallen asleep: after that, he was seen of James; then of all the Apostles: and last of all, he was seen of me also, as of one born out of due time. For I am the least of the Apostles, that am not meet to be called an Apostle, because I persecuted the Church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am: and his grace which was bestowed upon me was not in vain; but I laboured more abundantly than they all; yet not I, but the grace of God which was with me. THE GOSPEL

The Holy Gospel is written in the eighteenth chapter of the Gospel according to St Luke, beginning at the ninth verse.

THE COMMUNION

 \P In accordance with the Anglican tradition, Holy Communion is administered in both kinds i.e. the consecrated Bread and Wine. During the current pandemic, this can only be offered by intinction i.e. the consecrated wafer dipped in the consecrated wine, as the sharing of the Common Cup (Chalice) by sipping the consecrated wine is not permitted.
